Judy Bossuat's article in the European Suzuki Teachers' Newsletter last autumn has struck a chord. In our Suzuki Group we had also come to the conclusion that parents need more help and information than they usually get through observation, and have gradually arrived at an approach very similar to that outlined by Judy. Parents who come to us with their children after having observed for some time and having had an interview with one of the teachers are devoted parents, willing to do their very best for their children. They have the right to receive all the help we can give them

For the past year we have been using Susan Kemptner's book as a guideline for the parents' course. It gives seven lecture / discussion programmes, which contains most of the information parents need about the Suzuki Philosophy, about how to set up a practice routine with their children and about the difficulties they are bound to encounter. To give a small example: Before I had read the book, I had never thought of discussing with parents the location in their homes where they practice. Now I ask all the parents to make a sketch and to indicate where the child stands and where the parent sits in relation to the foot mat. We then discuss and often find better solutions. I also found out that it is better for children to practice with their backs parallel to a wall. They seem to understand sooner how

to stand and where the instrument goes in relation to their bodies.

The seven lectures/discussions have the following titles:

- Getting Started
- Introduction to the Suzuki Philosophy
- Creating a Home Environment
- Parent's Forum: Exchanging Ideas
- The World of the Very Young child
- Practice Incentives and Role Playing
- The Child's lesson

Of course, every teacher will, like us, adjust the seven lectures to his own style and convictions and may even re-write the whole series. We found this book a true eye-opener.

I used to sell my parents Nurtured by Love, and give them a few articles. Susan Kemptner not only hands out Nurtured by Love and Ability Development from Age Zero (also by Suzuki) and to Learn with Love by William and Constance Starr. She also asks the parents to write about the books so that the contents may be discussed.

Another very good idea is to hand out observation forms to be filled in when parents observe lessons of other children. They can give instructions about what to look out for during lessons. Good things are frequently achieved in lessons so unobtrusively that nobody observes it unless attention is especially drawn to it

One of the great things about Suzuki teaching is that we can constantly learn from one another. I have learned a lot from Susan Kemptner, to the benefit of my pupils.

#### Report from the Board Meeting

The board meeting dealt with a wide range of general, legal, financial and especially teacher training matters. The following sets out some of the most important decisions and discussions.

The Name Agreement with the ISA

The ESA concluded this agreement in January 1993, and the member associations are now in the process of signing sub-licences with the ESA; some have already completed. The Name Agreement could have far reaching implications because it will give each national association and its members the sole legal rights to use the Suzuki name (in combinations such as Suzuki Method and Suzuki Institute). It was also reported that progress has been made on a trade-mark sub-licence to deal with the sale of T-shirts and similar items.

The conclusion of these agreements marks a step forward in the relationship with the International Suzuki Association. The ESA board hopes eventually to conclude an agreement whereby subscriptions will be collected by the ESA from its members and paid on their behalf to the ISA. It will take some time to establish this, and in the meantime it was suggested that teachers should be encouraged to join the ISA individually on a voluntary basis.

**ESA Teaching Development Trust** 

Agreement in principle was reached to establish this new trust under the English Charities Act 1993. The first trustees were appointed, initially as a steering group whose brief is to draft the trust deed and apply for charitable status. They were Chairman elect, Haukur Hannesson and trustees elect, Henry Turner and Clare Santer. The secretary of the ESA was to act as secretary to the trust. The purpose is to provide support for teacher training in countries who at present have no Suzuki programmes. Summy-Birchard has promised to equal monies collected for the new trust. Haukur Hannesson appealed for donations from teachers and groups around Europe. Since then a donation of \$100 has been received from Antonio Mosca and BSI teacher trainee Jennifer-Anne Macmillan has raised £50 through a concert.

#### **ESA Directory**

It was confirmed that a new database would be established at the ESA office in Welwyn. Most country associations have already provided up-to-date address lists of teachers. The office will expect to be told of changes of address or levels on a regular basis by but individual association; members are also invited to notify us. especially teacher trainers. Once the database is established, copies of the directory will be sent to each national association. The directory will be up-dated regularly and a new edition issued annually.

#### ESA subscriptions and finance.

From January 1994 all enquiries regarding subscriptions and other financial matters should be sent to the ESA office in Welwyn, which will run the day-to-day bookkeeping on behalf of the ESA. The finances will continue to be monitored by the treasurer together with a small finance committee of which he will be the chairman. Quarterly reports will be sent to this committee and any board member who requests them.

#### Reports from the Instrumental Representatives

All the instrumental representatives emphasised that they would welcome questions or comments from other

teacher trainers as well as all other teachers of their instruments.

Violin and Viola: Clare Santer paid tribute to the contribution of her predecessor, Judy Bossuat, who had asked her to be care-taker until the next ballot. Much useful work culminated in the meeting of eighteen violin teacher trainers at the workshop in Düsseldorf. This had resulted in several concrete recommendations and much useful general discussion about the future of teacher training.

Piano: Anne Turner reported on a successful workshop in Denmark, where teachers met and discussed general issues, and on the international convention in Seoul. She had received complaints about the new edition of the piano repertoire from book 5-7. She would contact Summy-Birchard with these on behalf of the board and the teacher trainers...

Cello and Double Bass: Haukur Hannesson gave a comprehensive report on his general work and contact with teachers during the preceding year. He specifically reported on taking part in the recording session of the new cello recordings from books 1 to 3 as consultant producer at the invitation of Summy-Birchard. It had given him an opportunity to speak to colleagues from across the world. He hoped the final result would be as good as it promised.

Flute and singing: Marja Leena Mäkilä reported that the new teacher training programme for singing in the Suzuki style was now under way (see also the News from Finland); the progress of flute teacher training had been helped by the two visits from Mr Takahashi to the London workshop, which had been attended by teachers from Finland, Ireland, France and Belgium as well as England and Scotland.

Guitar: Elio Galvagno reported on progress in international great co-operation in the preceding year. The International Guitar Committee had been established as the first of such instrumental committees under the auspices of the ISA and chairmanship of William Kossler, and a new revised volume 1 for guitar had been agreed and would soon be published, closely followed by a new book 2.

#### **Teacher Training Manual**

The following changes or additions were made to the manual:

On p. 2 under Who can apply for training, add 'some form of' before 'audition'

On p. 6 Twinkle should be added to the repertoire list under level one for violin, piano and cello.

On p. 6, Appendix B a note should be added to the violin repertoire for level 5. Mozart concerto cadenzas may be left open to choice, but candidates may be demonstrate double stopping techniques.

Teacher trainees should be able to take assessments as well as examinations. In the case of assessments there should be no pass/fail, but written comments.

#### The Diploma of the European Suzuki Association - a Design Competition

The board has long been concerned that it has no certificate to mark the level 5 exam. Candidates are sent official letters of congratulations; but it is felt that a beautifully designed, traditional looking diploma would be appropriate. It was therefore decided to announce a design competition. This will be formally launched in the ESA Journal in the spring; but if anyone has any ideas in the meantime their suggestions would be gratefully received at the ESA Office.

#### New ESA teacher trainers

New appointments were agreed for: Violin: Lee Mosca, Italy; Piano: Kristjana Palsdottir, Iceland; Cello: Antonio Mosca, Italy and Reuben Rivera. France: Guitar: Elio Italy; Galvagno, Singing: Mette Heikkinen, Finland.

#### NEWS FROM ESA ASSOCIATIONS

#### BELGIUM

Talent Education Institute Belgium:

The National Suzuki workshop for violin was the highlight of an active year for all one hundred participants. Teachers such as Tove and Bela Detreköy, C Gähler, C. Goddard, J. Janssens, M Rygner and R Bakker made the workshop successful with individual lessons, group lessons and reading classes. Every participant performed a solo piece in concert. The parents' class, led by K. Rens, was extended with a double bass. Suzuki's piece 'Wishing' sounded great, with the big tone, thanks also to the musical support of the teachers. A concert by 'Long, long ago Suzuki pupils' showed the audience how the Suzuki Method can develop high levels musical expressiveness. participants were highly motivated; they enjoyed their progress in music and friendship.

#### **FINLAND**

Now that autumn has come to Finland with its windy, rainy days, it is nice to let one's mind drift back to our summer course which was held in Ellivuori Hotel, Vammala. Once again we had a splendid time playing together in our orchestras and enjoying the numerous students' concerts and other events. This summer we had two "guest stars" for violin, Tove and Bela Detreköy, twinkling with us. Other guest teachers were Carey Beth Hockett, cello and Christine Magasiner, piano, whose performance of The Swan (for cello, piano and tennis ball) was one of the highlights of the traditional "entertainment night" concert!

In September, violin teacher training was held for all levels with our teacher trainers Hannele Lehto, Marja Olamaa and Jyrki Pietilä in good form. Piano and cello teacher training continues with Ruth Miura and Carey Beth Hockett.

The first Suzuki viola group in Finland with four year old beginners

started two years ago, and the programme has expanded with a new group this autumn. We are using 1/16th size violins, with strings changed to EGDA, and continuing the interesting experiment with an 1/8th size violin (strings changed to CGDA) which has a hole under the bridge, somewhat like the old Welsh instrument, the crwth, making it possible to use a more resonant C string. Heikki Puukko will be pleased to give further information and details about the instruments.

In Flute, a group of 18 teachers, children and parents participated in the flute course which was held in London 23-29 July 1993. At the invitation of the Minister of Social Health and Welfare a group of Heli Talvitie's flute students performed on 9th May in the National Mother's Day concert in the Government Festival Hall.

Maarit Honkanen-Hilli, pianist, and Marja-Leena Mäkila, flautist ( & president of the Finnish Suzuki Association!) have both received grants from the Sasakawa Foundation to further their studies in Matsumoto. Three of Maarit's young students recently performed with the Tapiola Sinfonietta, a well-known chamber orchestra as part of a concert for promising young soloists.

At the Convention in Korea Päivi Kukkamäki presented daily "singing in the Suzuki Style". Teacher training was attended by 40 participants as part of the Vocal and Early Education timetable. It was fascinating becoming acquainted with singing traditions in the Far East. We realised that the vocal exercises are international and equally suited to Asian children.

Teacher training courses in singing are being held in Finland for two separate groups: vocal teachers and early education teachers. Vocal teachers may specialise in Suzuki singing teacher training. Early education teachers will receive ideas on planning singing group lessons, and guidelines on how to use their voices.

#### **GERMANY**

Teachers from thirteen different European countries met to exchange ideas and make music together at the European Suzuki Workshop for String Teachers: 26th-31st March 1993 at the Academy Remscheid. Most were violinists, including 18 of the ESA teacher trainers for violin.

Professor Gerhard Mantel in addition to his role as master teacher for the cello course, addressed the workshop on 'Body movement and sound'; Anders Gron performed two of J S Bach's Solo suites for celloat the recital which was one of the highlights of the workshop. Solo performances by outstanding young violinists from Germany completed the programme. Another highlight was the Master class given by Koji Toyoda.

All the teachers who were able to fit it into their timetable took part in the orchestra conducted by Bela Detrekoy, who also, together with Lipman, provided Felicity advanced course teaching. Other teachers included Judy Bossuat and Sven Siögren, who took the early Jeanne Jannssens. stages. Tove Detreköy, Susan Johnson and Ana Maria Sebastian.

The workshop was beautifully organised by Kerstin Wartberg. The programme was enhanced by the beauty of the setting and excellent facilities.

#### **GREAT BRITAIN**

The main event of 1993 was the British Suzuki Institute's National Concert in May at the wonderful new Symphony Hall in Birmingham.

The concert was organised by a local committee chaired by Heather Clemson. The BSI provided administrative back-up and box office.. Children aged from 4 to 18 took part in groups, ensembles and solo items. For the first time there was an orchestra. which consisted of children from the West Midlands, most of whom had been taught in local schools. At the end a Grand Finale enabled over 100 young violinists from the audience to join the 150 performers on stage for three short pieces, a moment in front of the lights, and an exciting end to the day. The concert raised nearly £1500 for Action Research and a similar amount for the BSI.

Flute teacher training was given a boost by another visit from Toshio Takahashi from Japan. New courses for Cello will begin early in the new year, directed by Carey Beth Hockett. Violin and piano teacher training continued at Hitchin, but will move to London next year, with new courses from April.

#### **SWEDEN**

We now have 52 local groups in Sweden and one in Norway. The one in Norway is temporary until they can set up their own national association.

As in the summer of 1992, we had a workshop for teachers at Skokloster in the summer of 1993 attended by 21 violinist, 3 violists, 9 cellists and 9 pianist. Teachers were Edith Code from Denmark (viola), Alison Apley from England, Lilja Hjaltadottir from Icleand and Sven Sjögren from Sweden (violin), Anne Grabe from France and Sylvia Jacobsson from Sweden (cello) and Ruth Miura from Finland (piano).

The course was held in the environment stimulating of Swedish baroque castle of Skokloster, beautifully situated on the Mälar Lake near Uppsala and Stockholm. The teachers' workshop ended with a concert, which was also the start of the children's workshop for 15 pre-twinkle, 120 violin, 21 cello and 25 piano pupils. At Skokloster 17 students of book seven or above with previous orchestra experience took part in a chamber music course, directed by Pär Peterson from Uppsala, assisted by Leif Elving from Gothenburg.

As usual, another workshop for children was held at the same time at the cosy Backagården near Lund in Southern Sweden. 80 violin, 5 viola and 20 cello students took part here.

New for this autumn is the possibility of studying for Suzuki violin levels at the University course at 'Musikhögskolan' in Piteå with Sven Sjögren as course teacher.

A major concert is being planned for UN Day on 24th October 1993 at the splendid Bergweald Hall in Stockholm, with selected Suzuki pupils from Nordic countries as performers.
